The business part of the meeting included the very positive feedback on the afternoon tea which took place in August at The St Brelade's Bay Hotel.




Our speaker, Carl Walker, Chair of the Jersey Consumer Council, gave an entertaining and informative talk about the purpose of the council. Its primary aims are to raise consumer issues, educate, inform and lobby. He highlighted some of the recent campaigns which the council has been involved in such as: obtaining credit cards for Jersey residents; The Jersey Gas compensation scheme; the high mortgage rates on the island; the people who are left behind with the increasing use of technology in everyday lives.


He finished his talk by describing some of the tricks which supermarkets use to encourage customers to buy more and highlighted the Consumer Council app, Price.je which highlights the cheapest prices on petrol, fuel and 150 supermarket items.

#### St. Clement

Our Guest Speaker for our September meeting was Catherine Porter who is the Records Manager at Jersey Heritage and who gave us a most interesting talk on the roads and buildings and area around Le Hocq and Pontac in the Parish of St Clement.



We were informed that Pontac means 'Lookout' and 'A Place for Watching'




The Caldwell Hall was at one time St Clement Parish Hall, but this became too small for

the growing Parish and so this building was gifted to St Clement Parish Church and a new Parish Hall was specially built for the community and was completed in 1971. Next to the Parish Church a house was built in 1829 and it was named 'The Priory'. This house was bought and sold a few times until Ann Street Brewery purchased the building which became The Priory Public House for a number of years, until it was sold in recent years and has been reverted back to a private dwelling.



At one time the Le Hocq Pub stretched further towards Jambart Lane – it is the most southerly pub in the British Isles. At one time the Pontac Gardens (by the Pontac House Hotel) were once home to wild animals and the public paid an entrance fee to see them! Le Hocq Tower is one of the earliest to be built. The Eastern Railway used to run through the Parish of St Clement – a plaque is on the wall by the old railway bridge at the back of St Clement Parish Hall and the Le Hocq Railway Station building is now a private dwelling.



There was so much interesting information and this is just a 'snippet' of our very enjoyable and informative afternoon.

#### La Moye

Our speaker, Susie Richardson, gave us a very inspirational talk about her work as Prison Governor at La Moye. She has now left her post after three years but plans to stay in Jersey with her family.

Susie has studied the psychology and the roots of crime and found strong links between offenders who had undiagnosed dyslexia leading to a path of failure at school, truancy, crime and ultimately re-offending. She has been very keen to create a 'rehabilitative culture' in prison which means normalising life in prison and making it less institutionalised to ease that transition back into everyday life on release giving prisoners a purpose when they leave prison.



Susie has worked extensively in the UK in Bristol and Stafford prison where she did a lot of research for her degree giving her experience of a diverse range of crimes including a review of women's prisons. She then became Deputy Governor in Winchester prison before coming to Jersey and took it out of special measures after it was broken and failing. Having met many hardened criminals and murderers during her career Susie still believes in a system that follows the example of a prison in Norway which is said to be one of the best in the world.

La Moye prison is very different and fully staffed, can accommodate up to 200 inmates and is able to transfer those with mental health issues to the UK for special help. Staff are trained in Jersey and have better pay than prison officers in the UK. Offenders can learn hairdressing skills taught by Highland tutors, help in the kitchen, learn barista skills and carpentry. The recent art exhibition displayed by the prisoners showed some incredible talent in various mediums. Plans are still in place for a café attached to the prison with money donated by Rotary for a mobile coffee shop.



Members were very generous in donating many goods for the Tinathon next month.

#### **Sirens**

Sirens September meeting was a talk by Matthew Price which was very interesting. The talk was on how the BBC can keep the radio and television programmes interesting to today's changing world with technology. Keeping the younger generation interested, when they watch YouTube, Netflix rather than watch normal television.

Our social was crazy golf, but had to be cancelled due to bad weather.



#### St. Lawrence

September feels like a new year after our long summer break, but the beginning of a 'new term' saw us having a fascinating demonstration from Darlene Hewlett, Vice President of St. Martin's Flower Club, who showed us the options of arranging "Flowers without Foam". Having demonstrated the use of various 'flower frogs' with spikes or holes, and how to make natural materials into supportive structures which can be used inside vases or bowls to hold the flower stems securely, she made four beautiful arrangements using a variety of containers and flowers which then went on to be our raffle prizes. The fortunate winners were Karen, Pauline, Elvina and Rosemarie





The Henwood Trophy was for craft this year - "An Autumn Picture" which had to contain some pulses. Only two entries, but still a difficult choice for Darlene to make; a beautiful autumn tree by Jackie Fromage or a delicate collage of dried material from Sharon Knight. Sharon was the winner.

We are looking forward to a full programme of autumn events that will include our fundraising Bingo on 29th October to which all WI members are invited, and a very special celebration in November of St Lawrence WI's 75th anniversary at St. Brelade's Bay Hotel!

#### St. Ouen

St. Ouen's WI enjoyed a most informative talk at their September meeting by Judith Hopkins who runs the Community Support Team in St. Ouen. The team was set up shortly after income support was centralized by the government. Many of the parishes realised that they were losing contact with vulnerable people in their parishes and decided to set up a group that would provide support and assistance to their parishioners, helping them live independently in the community.

St. Ouen was amongst one of the first parishes to set up a team offering help from shopping, visiting the bank, attending medical appointments, collecting a prescription, to visits to the hairdressers. Even those finding forms difficult to complete can call on a member of the team

to assist them; transport can also be provided to community activities or if someone simply would like a friendly person to chat to.

Although Judith did point out that the team did not provided a carer service, as one parishioner requested that a someone come along and bath her husband, a gentle refusal was given.



#### Le Hocq

Stuart Nicolle from Jersey Archives was the guest speaker for the September meeting, originally records were kept in several places, and at one time some records were stolen though 90% were recovered.

Two rooms were acquired at the Museum in 1993.

There are thirty one thousand registration cards of everyone over the age of fourteen. Of Churches there were originally thirty Methodist Churches, also records of Channel Island Family History. Records of Merchant ships from 1768 when the Chamber of Commerce was formed in the days of privateering.

Linda Romeril is the curator of the museum. The JEP has one and a half million photographs. Talks are given to some schools which is important as there is a need for Jersey's history as an Island to be remembered as many people are tracing their own. The TV programme "Who Do You Think You Are" reveals some fascinating details of the person's family going back centuries.

Mr Nicolle touched on many other details which made for a very interesting meeting.

#### First Tower & Millbrook

Maria & Mandy took the meeting as Heidi and Rosemary were away. We had a new room to hold our meeting in, which was much bigger & cosier. We had Jenny Langlois about exercise classes but who also deals with pain support.
