

every decade, a fantastic achievement. Sally met her husband, Charlie, in 1985 and they married in 1986. Charlie was a huge support to Sally.



In 2016 Sally swam to France and back to Folkestone in 36 hours 21 minutes. Her most recent Channel swim was in 2022 and she dedicated this swim to Charlie. Members wanted to know when she planned her next swim! Sally brought her MBE, photos with Prince Charles and certificates from The Guinness Book of records. The talk was memorable and inspiring. Sally certainly deserves all her many accolades and awards.

St. Lawrence

A Happy New Year to you all.

It seems a long break since we had our meeting in the Parish Hall - November out with a damaged roof and December we were outfor dinner.

Colleen Vautier received her certificate for 35 years membership of the WI. Others members are thinking about the many federation craft competitions while also joining in with our book club, supper club or other activities in St Lawrence.

This January we followed a traditional evening with Lucy Stephenson as our speaker. Her mother had been a member of St Lawrence WI.

Lucy spoke about her career as a journalist. After university she had some experience of the national press but that made her realise that her real vocation was for regional press with its sense of community unlike the national press that can be hard nosed. This brought her back home to Jersey to the JEP. The news room is very reliant on people sending in news observations. Eventually personal experience and that of others led Lucy to lead some newspaper capaigns. Side-by Side responded to the floods in Madeira.

They raised £100,000 for the people. Lucy went



to Madeira a year later to see how the recovery was going. The Love Hearts Appeal for organ donation and Tiny Seeds fertility charity touch issues of personal experience for Lucy but also serve to help people going through difficult situations feel less alone. I assume that Lucy's experience as a political journalist and her experiences of community issues and campaigns led Lucy into politics. She finds being on the other side of an interview for example does give her a different perspective. She tries to answer very fully so that she is clear about the factors affecting any issue. She was asked by a member how she had dealt with her emotions when dealing with a difficult situation to report. Lucy said that a journalist tries to stay focussed and professional but that there is a contrast between the follow-up support given to members of the emergency services and almost none for a journalist. Something she considers needs rethinking. At the end of an engrossing talk Jennifer Jones gave a fulsome vote of thanks.

Greve D'Azette

Members of Greve d'Azette and St Clement's WI met at the Parish Hall for a joint meeting.

Our speaker was Rachael Andrews from Riding For the Disabled Association. Rachael was accompanied by Kerry one of the volunteers. A very informative video was shown explaining that donkeys were ridden at the beginning but now they ride ponies. We were told that ponies have the correct temperament, they are quiet and don't react to sudden movements. The Association began by taking children from Mont a L'Abbe and Bel Royal Schools but now include children from Rouge Bouillon, Springfield, St Clement and Plat Douet Schools. These riding sessions help children with physical, learning difficulty, autism, and low esteem. They also take children to The Calvert Trust Activity Centre Exmoor. This Centre was founded to enable people with disabilities to benefit from outdoor activities in the countryside.



Rachael ended this extremely interesting talk by saying that they need a large number of volunteers to help run the riding sessions and that the association relies solely on donations.

Rachael and Kerry were warmly thanked for such an interesting and informative talk.
